Disability affects approximately 12% of the U.S. population.

26%

In 2019, 26% of individuals with disability (8-64 years) lived in poverty compared to 11% of individuals without disability.



Nearly 8 in 10 individuals with disabilities were not in the labor force in 2022, compared with 3 in 10 of those with no disability.

19%

Nineteen percent of people with disabilities were employed in 2021 compared to 63% without a disability.

What Can You Do?

Increase Awareness

Discuss employment options at an early age during IEP meetings. Attend local job fairs and reach out to your contacts in local businesses. Share employment success stories of students with disabilities to create understanding, stimulate imagination, and increase awareness of all stakeholders.

Raise Expectations

Clearly communicate high expectations to students at a young age. Visit the I'm Determined website for information and opportunities to practice skills associated with self-determined behavior. imdetermined.org

Enhance Collaborations

Develop a working knowledge of the services for students transitioning into competitive employment. Invite agencies and community partners to IEP meetings.

Implement Better Practices

Provide students with disabilities access to more rigorous coursework, career readiness curriculum, and effective practices that will lead to competitive, integrated employment.
